At end of Semester III, the ASN Student:

1. Uses the nursing process with guidance as a basis for decision making to provide care for individuals.
2. Provides nursing care to individuals experiencing common health problems.
3. Demonstrates management skills in self direction and coordination of safe care for individuals.
4. Communicates appropriate health information with individuals and other health team members.
5. Uses information from current literature to provide safe care for individuals.
6. Adheres to legal and ethical guidelines as designated by the profession of nursing and the Nurse Practice Act in providing care to individuals.

At end of Semester IV, the ASN Student:

1. Uses the nursing process with minimal guidance as a basis for decision making to provide care for individuals and families.
2. Provides nursing care to individuals and families across the lifespan.
3. Uses management skills to enhance quality of health care for individuals and families.
4. Communicates appropriate health information to individuals, families, and other health team members.
5. Uses information from current literature to provide safe nursing care to individuals and families.
6. Adheres to legal and ethical guidelines as designated by the profession of nursing and the Nurse Practice Act in providing care to individuals and families.

Upon completion of the ASN Program, the ASN student:

1. Uses the nursing process as a basis for decision making to provide care for individuals and groups throughout the lifespan.
 2. Provides nursing care for individuals and groups experiencing common and complex health states.
 3. Manages care for a group of clients to enhance the quality of health care within primary, secondary, and tertiary care settings.
 4. Communicates effectively to coordinate health care of individuals and groups.
 5. Participates in learning activities to maintain safe practice.
 6. Practices within the legal and ethical expectations as designated by the profession of nursing and the Nurse Practice Act.
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
